

A Conversation with Quinn Lake: Working as a Private Teacher Eric Crawford

On November 7 of 2014, a group of students from the KASTA chapter at Wichita State University met to hear a presentation by Quinn Lake. Quinn is a cellist with the Wichita Symphony Orchestra, and is one of the most successful private teachers in south-central Kansas. She operates a full-time teaching studio, and wanted to share some of her secrets of the trade with others that might aspire to take the same path. She began her conversation with an icebreaker. "I'm an ASTA member, so I'm among friends."

Her first point was to talk about the pros and cons of being a full-time private teacher. Among her pros was that being self-employed is empowering. You get to make your own schedule, set your own rules, and set your own rate of pay. She did mention, however, the cons of having an awkward schedule and not having sick time or vacation time.

One of her most adamant points was the need to run your studio like a business. She spoke about constantly thinking of the marketability of her product. She also said that it was very important for her to continue to hone her craft as a performer. She feels that she brings the things she continues to learn as a cellist back to her students.

Quinn also talked about the importance of knowing and being a part of the community. Knowing the classroom teachers, the youth orchestra conductors, the university professors, and the other private teachers help to give her more tools that she can share with her students. She says it is very important for her to know the community so that she knows what opportunities she can offer to the members of her studio.

One important item that she shared was something that was probably the furthest from her audience's mind. She spoke a great deal about how it is important to be familiar with the tax code. She said that she always hires someone to do her taxes, and how she needs to keep incredibly meticulous spreadsheets with her expenses. This was an important yet commonly overlooked part of the puzzle to being a successful private teacher.

The most inspiring part of her conversation was her obvious enthusiasm for what she does. She spoke about the need to constantly challenge and inspire her students, no matter where they were on their musical journey. Her passion for private teaching was evident and contagious to all in attendance.
